Labour in a Global Economy

Working women and men in formal and informal employment and their trade unions are facing the challenges of rapid economic and social change.

The current form of globalisation is undermining the social fabric of many societies, without providing an adequate new regulatory and protective framework.

The GLU encourages research and debate on social and economic policies in order to promote a socially and environmentally sustainable and inclusive model of globalisation.

The Masters programmes equip trade unionists engaging more efficiently in social dialogue, public debate and policy implementation to achieve decent work for all. This includes living wages, social security, gender equality, workers' rights and social justice, all of which are key to combating poverty and social exclusion.

Multidisciplinary

All programmes are multidisciplinary, combining sociology, economics, political science, labour law, and history.

Language

Sufficient knowledge in English is a necessary condition for participation. However, as this is a challenge for many participants special courses are offered at the beginning of the programmes helping students to further improve their language skills.

International

The Global Labour University (GLU) is a network of universities, international and national trade unions, civil society organisations and the International Labour

Organisation to provide postgraduate qualification programmes for trade unionists and labour experts. The unique global cooperation between academic institutions, the labour movement and the ILO offers students a wide range of academic and practical expertise. The global composition of students creates a genuine "one world" research and learning environment. Internships with Global Unions, the ILO and trade union organisations in Europe, Latin America and Africa provide practical insights into policies and initiatives to promote better labour rights and offer exceptional opportunities for research work.

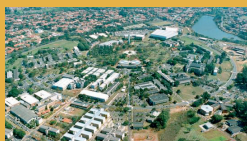

UNIVERSITÄT KASSEL/FHW BERLIN



The program is jointly offered by the University of Kassel and the Berlin School of Economics; two academic institutions with special expertise on global governance, macroeconomics and the informal economy.

The focus of the Master programme “Labour Policies and Globalisation” is on understanding and addressing the challenges for labour posed by corporate decisions on investments across nations, by predominantly supply-side oriented macroeconomics, and by neo-liberal rules for trade and finance on a global level. Discussion of the adequacy of alternative policies for labour is a central element throughout the programme.



Close cooperation with the German trade union federation (DGB) and European trade unions provide insights in the practice of social dialogue, collective bargaining, and co-determination in the German and European context.
